#### **Brief Lesson Overview:**

In this assignment students learn the history of zines as a tool for activism, and then create their own original zines where they promote a social justice topic they are passionate about.

### Materials Needed:

YouTube video, paper, scissors, pencil,  $\mathcal E$  sharpie

# **Learning Outcomes:**

CP30.2 Independently plan and create art works, in selected media and forms, demonstrating personal voice and artistic growth. Learning Target: I can create an 8 page zine (made out of 8.5 x 11" paper) that explores a social justice topic that I care about.

## Structure / Activity:

- Show this video to students. Saskatchewan artist Tal Marsolais describes how art can help provide an outlet to process one's emotions and thoughts. Tal discusses the history of zines and demonstrates how to create a zine.
- Explain that students will be creating their own zines using 8x11 pieces of paper. Follow the steps in Tal's video to cut & fold their papers correctly.
- I often get students to draw their zines on the folded papers, as drawing on unfolded papers may result in upside down images/out of order.
- I encourage students to polish their images with a sharpie and offer them the choice of leaving their zines black & white OR having their zines photocopied in multiples so they can experiment with colouring these in.
- \*I often get students to create a larger, polished, social justice artwork inspired by one page of their zine. I get them to emulate the resistance/resilience artist they critiqued (CP30.4)
